It will reopen on Tuesday, Aug. 9 **Draft Minutes of Monthly Meeting for Business Held Sixth Month 19, 2016** At Green Street Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends, held at 45 West School House Lane, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on Sixth Month 19, 2016: Business meeting convened at 12:40 PM in prayerful silence.

After a period of silence, the Clerk asked Friends to share a treasured memory of summer from childhood. Friends shared stories of family weeding while saying the rosary; jumping in rain puddles; riding the trolley to grandmother's home; climbing way to the top of rock piles; walking in bare feet down the gravel path; camp with the very entertaining young Jerry Blavat; building enormous bonfires at camp; enjoying family time by the lake in the Winnebago; and family traveling to camping destinations in the VW bus. Friends were enriched by this sharing.

The Clerk offered gratitude for the delicious meal and hospitality provided by Tracey Smith and Valerie Anderson.

Greene Street Friends School - Multipurpose Building Update

Anne Bayless and Anthony DiGiovanni provided an update on Greene Street Friends School. A handout titled "Multipurpose Building - Facts at a Glance" was given to all Friends present. Originally the architect engaged for this project was to join Friends today, but this was delayed as budget and project alternatives are still being reviewed. It is likely the architect will join Friends sometime after August.

This document distributed tells the story of the Master Planning process and the buying of the bank building. Purchasing the bank building and parking lot some years ago gave the school the opportunity to create a green space where before there had been a paved parking lot. The strategic plan for the School was to grow to two classes per grade and no larger than that. To reach the goal, more space was needed. Also, the Master/Strategic planning process showed that there is an interest in arts and music and sports at the school. The current facilities are cramped, and there is no place where the entire school community can gather together. Building a multipurpose facility will meet those needs.

This year for the first time there will be two classes per grade in the entire school. The Meeting community provided a lead gift for the fundraising for the new building. The school remains committed to keeping tuition low relative to other private schools. For that, the school needed to fundraise enough money to pay for the project without relying on current parents. That fundraising is going well.

With regard to the new multipurpose building, there is a process in place to gain input from many people...faculty, administration, parent/professionals, board, Meeting and local community. The architect, Digsau, has much experience in the ways of Friends. Guiding principles include simplicity, transition, materiality and light, and the design concept for campus is to have the Meetinghouse at the center with openness and connectivity to the local community. There is a commitment to build what is sufficient for the School's needs, something that will stand the test of time and still be within budget. The building will have equal focus on performing arts and athletics.

Friends accepted this report and asked questions to further understand the history and the project.

Also exciting, the Horizons Program is starting this summer on the campus of Greene Street Friends School. The purpose is of the project is to prevent summer slide for students whose families are economically disadvantaged.
