Americans' lives are threatened by gun violence everywhere – in schools, houses of worship, theaters, offices, homes, and public spaces. There is nowhere left that is immune to this out-of-control epidemic. That's why we're committed to telling the stories of how guns — and the billions made off of them by the NRA and gun companies — affect the safety of everyday Americans and what can be done to put an end to this profit-driven crisis.

Through films and campaigns, we are working to educate and mobilize parents, students, teachers, doctors, activists, and organizations across the country to take action and fight back against this senseless and preventable epidemic tearing our country apart.

Our member Edward F.T. Rice passed away at the age of 99 years, on 4 May 2016.

He was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 2 January 1917.

He graduated from Friends Central High School (Philadelphia) in 1935 and from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (Troy, NY), from which he received degrees in Chemical Engineering (B.S.

1938, M.S. 1939), and election to the Sigma Xi honor society. He was a lifelong member of the Green Street Meeting of the Society of Friends in Philadelphia. On Christmas Day 1939 he married the love of his life Greta Jackson Rice, who passed away in March 2010, a few months after their 70th anniversary. His son John died at age 15, (a loss he never fully recovered from.)

A member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, his initial career was as a specialist in synthetic dyestuffs and rubber at the General Aniline Company (now GAF) in Albany, NY, before his deployment in government service with the National Production Authority in Washington, DC, during the Korean War. He remained a member of the National Defense Executive Reserve from 1953. In this same year he began work at the Dupont Chemical Company, and shortly after he was appointed editor of "The Elastomers Notebook." He also served as the Advanced Defensive Driving Instructor for all Dupont traveling salesmen for 29 years, until his retirement in 1989. Chief among his hobbies were playing handball as a member of the YMCA since 1943 and

maintaining detailed statistical records for his two passions: distance running and endurance driving. These records tell us he ran the equivalent of the earth's circumference, over 25,000 miles, since age 56, and that he had accumulated running mileage in all 50 states (and the District of Columbia), in over 40 different countries, and on all 7 continents including Antarctica. He completed his first marathon at age 61 in 3 hours and 47 minutes. Among his driving records (he continued to drive daily until his death), his greatest accomplishment was an endurance trip through all 48 contiguous states in 12 ½ days (9,273.7 miles), in 1949, which became a feature item in "Ripley's Believe it or Not." Among his other interests were proper English usage, word games and trivia, completing crossword puzzles and double-crostics, competing with the nightly contestants on "Jeopardy," watching NFL football—especially his beloved Eagles—travel, and wide reading.

Long before Google, he was a primary source of knowledge and information for all that knew him. Among his remaining significant interests was an enthusiasm for climbing things: In later life he climbed Mt. Katahdin in Maine (3 times), Ayers Rock in Australia, and Mt. Santis in the Swiss Alps. He scaled the towers of the Delaware Memorial, George Washington, and other high bridges for professional reasons, as well as the still unopened Empire State Building for personal reasons, unobserved by security, when he was 14-years old. Other notable structures he was proud of having mounted are the Washington Monument, the Tower of Pisa, the dome of St. Peter's Cathedral, and the spire of the Ulm Cathedral. His secret nutritional supplement was chocolate chip cookies. Anthony Benezet Marker to be Dedicated on Saturday, June 4

A historical marker describing Quaker reformer Anthony Benezet will be dedicated on Saturday, June 4, at 11 AM, at 325 Chestnut Street, in Philadelphia. The ceremony is likely to be held in the park across the street. Anthony Benezet was a key figure in organizing local, national, and international antislavery movements in the 1700s, and he was a pioneer in education for girls and blacks in the colonies. From 1753 until his death in 1784, he lived in a building that was located at what is now 325 Chestnut Street. The Monthly Meeting of Friends of Philadelphia (Arch Street) is sponsoring this dedication ceremony. Free and open to the public.
