Minutes of Monthly Meeting for Business Held Tenth Month 16, 2016

At Green Street Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends, held at 45 West School House Lane, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on Tenth Month 16, 2016.

Business Meeting convened at 12:45 PM in prayerful silence.

16-10-01 The clerk welcomed Friends, holding hands around the circle.

16-10-02 Friends approved minutes from Ninth month.

16-10-03 Friends reviewed, amended and approved the agenda.

16-10-04 Care and Counsel

Doris Clinkscale reported. She read a letter from Nashville Friends Meeting approving transfer of membership of Mina Baisch from their meeting to Green Street Meeting. The meeting joyfully accepts the recommendation of Care and Counsel to transfer her membership to Green Street Meeting. JoAnn Seaver, Bill Van Stone, Mary Joy Benson and Traci Hjelt Sullivan agree to serve on a welcoming committee.

16-10-05 Naming Committee Report

Chris Mohr reported on the progress of the Naming Committee. The committee is in process, and hopes to bring a slate of names before the meeting during the November Meeting for Business.

16-10-06 Care Relationship with Greene Street Friends School - Questions for Head of School Friends generated a series of questions to guide the Head of School as he prepares his report for the Eleventh Month Meeting for Business. If anyone has questions or concerns they would like to pass on, please communicate them to the Clerk.

16-10-07 Trustees Report

Traci Hjelt Sullivan, treasurer of the Trustees, reported.

We were reminded that the Trustees lost their 501c3 for a while, but all contributions to the meeting during that time are still fully tax deductible. The Trustees' 501c3 status has now been regained.

Friends were reminded that the meeting has considerable wealth, managed by the Trustees. Are we being intentional about our use of this wealth? Very little of the Trustees assets are restricted, which means the trustees have legal flexibility about how and whether to spend them.

Friends asked for clarification about the "two layers" of accounting. The Trustees manage a large reserve. The current practice is that the income from that reserve is passed to the Meeting. The meeting then creates and manages a budget for that income from the Trustees (plus contributions). The meeting also has financial reserves of its own. Occasionally the Trustees make extra payments on behalf of the meeting (over and above income). Last year included two examples of extra payments—one to EMIR, and another to GSFS.

In response to questions, the Trustees stated that they were ready to contribute extra funds toward the kitchen remodeling project. In addition, the meeting could certainly propose other uses of the Trustees reserves. One Friend asked if the Trustees might consider investing in solar panels for the new school building and then sell electricity to the school/grid.

A Friend inquired whether any of the Trustees Reserves were invested in Friends Fiduciary Green Fund. We learned that when Trustees want to balance their investments, moving assets from

specific stocks to mutual funds, they intend to make these movements into the Green Fund. They have already made one such investment.

One Friend raised the question of where our wealth has come from, and what are the meeting's obligations of accumulated historical wealth that we are now entrusted with? Trustees do have some knowledge about where our worth has come from, but more research could be done.

Friends asked questions and found clarity about what the Trustees are and what our budgeting process is. The clerk expressed appreciation for the hard work and diligence of the trustees and the treasurer especially.

16-10-08 Discussion of Relationship with POWER

Anthony DiGiovanni reported. Friends were asked to consider the organization POWER (Philadelphians Organized to Witness, Empower and Rebuild) and discuss entering into a more formal relationship with the group. POWER is an interfaith community organizing movement. It has a robust structure of teams that work on multiple campaigns in three categories: Jobs, Criminal Justice and Education. These teams are staffed by individuals from member congregations. Friends explored and raised questions about this idea. There was general enthusiasm, but also caution. Friends are asked to consider whether we have capacity to participate in POWER with integrity - but also to remember that there is vast and exciting potential to be harnessed by associating with this group. There is a possibility of co-joining with Germantown Monthly Meeting. This will be brought back for consideration next month.

16-10-09 Visioning Workshop - Chris Mohr and Cheryl McFadden

Continuing from the "How Good Could it Be?" workshop, which looked at growing our meeting, Chris Mohr reported on the excitement of possibilities in our meeting. He revisited the process so far and explained the next step, which will be to solicit feedback from the meeting at large on the four areas that have been identified: Spiritual, Community, Facilities and Youth. He suggested engaging the all ages worship with this next step of the process on the fifth Sunday of October.

16-10-10 These minutes were approved.

16-10-11 Friends ended in worship.

The meeting adjourned, agreeing to meet again at the appointed time Eleventh Month 20, 2016.

Toward a Sustainable 19144, by Susan Christian

The coming of autumn was not welcome this year -- I just hadn't had enough peaches when all of a sudden they were gone from grocery store shelves. But I have come back around to loving the fall and here's why: we have a dogwood tree in our yard, and I can see and hear the frenzy of activity from squirrels and birds going for the dogwood's bright red berries. In the space of two minutes this morning I saw a robin, a blue jay, a morning dove, a flock of sparrows and a cardinal move into and through that tree.

In contrast to the dogwood, its neighbor, the Japanese maple, is completely silent – no berries for the wildlife. These two trees have outgrown their space and we have struggled with the choice of which tree to remove. The choice is now clear. The Japanese maple offers nothing to wildlife because it's not native. The dogwood is a necessity to local wildlife because they are native and they evolved together. When selecting shrubs or trees or perennial flowers for your home, opt for the native species—they survive the droughts better and they offer life-sustaining food to the wildlife. *From the editor: Please check out the website for connection to this blog and others*.

News from the wider world of Friends: 2016 World Quaker Day in Bolivia

Jeff Keith, a member of our Communications Program Group, was in La Paz for World Quaker Day. He writes about the event hosted at the Friends International Bilingual Center:

"Some Bolivian Adult Friends have opened the Friends International Bilingual Center (FIBC), a new Quaker house in La Paz, to bring together both Bolivian Quakers and those from other countries who want to visit Bolivia. Emma Condori, the director of the FIBC, invited many Bolivian Quakers to come to the center on Sunday, October 2, to celebrate World Quaker Day all afternoon.

Over 50 Friends including children, young adults, and older adults attended the celebration, representing four Bolivian yearly meetings as well as myself from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting in the United States.

We socialized, worshiped together, played games, and enjoyed refreshments and excellent music. Emma and other Friends helping out with this event showed videos of the FWCC gatherings in Kenya and Peru. We also watched the QuakerSpeak video, "Listening in Tongues." Friends described several of the Bolivian yearly meetings and then I described what an unprogrammed Quaker meeting with silence-based or "expectant" worship was like. In particular, I said that our worship services are hardly ever completely silent, and that many inspirational messages get shared. It was a great privilege for me to be able to share this event with my Bolivian sisters and brothers." This article was written by Jeff Keith of Central Philadelphia MM.
